Left to Right, John Tolbert, Patrick O'Neill, Robert Rivera, and John Mattern.



1. *Start attending Clan/Chapter meetings.* This is a good way to meet your fellow arrowmen. Also, you will meet Clan or Chapter officers at these events.



3. *Run for office.* Sure, it sounds crazy, but it's the most fun you'll have all year. As an officer, you get to meet a variety of arrowmen, attend Lodge Executive Board Meetings, and lead meetings of your home Clan/Chapter.

4. *Keep going to your troop meetings.* Try to make Cheerful Service a reality in your home unit. Remember, OA is in ADDITION TO, not INSTEAD OF a regular troop.

5. *Get your Brotherhood.* This means showing up to another Ordeal, except this time, you get to eat. The Brotherhood Honor seals your membership with the Order of the Arrow. 6. *Remember, you are only as active as you want to be.* If you have no desire to participate in the OA, that's your choice. If you want limited involvement, that's fine too. The final choice is up to you.

Last year in July a Lodge

On the down side we did *not* make National Quality Lodge this year due to a lack of growth in our membership. However, with a little effort we can correct this and make it happen in this year.

On the more positive note, I would like to congratulate and thank all of our newly elected officers, James E. West, Founders Award, Silver Fluke and Vigil recipients, and those who attended NOAC and the NLS for their devotion and self sacrifice for the greater good of the Order of the Arrow

Arrowman Service Award



The Arrowman Service Award (ASA) was started in 2001 as a means of recognizing service to the lodge on a national level. The award is only available for three years, and is now entering the final year of the original plan. It will be available until December 31st, 2003. The

Order of the Arrow's vision for the future emphasizes a strategy of increased service to the Boy Scouts of America by Arrowmen. To reward those Arrowmen who go beyond their immediate responsibilities to help and guide others to new heights, the Order of the Arrow created the *Arrowman Service Award*. The award will focus on three areas of service: personal, chapter/lodge activities, and general service to the community.

Contrary to popular belief, if you missed the first award session, you can still earn the first award. Three different awards are available. The first award is a red arrow with a gold compass emblazoned on it, suspended from a white ribbon. It is worn in place of the Universal Ribbon. The award can be earned up to 3 times in a three-year period. Each time it is awarded, a different color compass is placed on the arrowhead.

The timeline of the award will begin on January 1, 2001, and will end on December 31, 2003. The award may be earned in the year 2001, 2002, and 2003. All first time recipients may purchase the original award (the white ribbon with the gold compass). Arrowmen who earn the award more than once during the outlined three year period (2001-2003) may purchase the silver attachment for having completed this award a second time (2002 or 2003 only) and the bronze attachment for having completed this award a third time (2003 only). The attachment will be worn on the award's white ribbon. Signatures of approval will be required for each requirement.

If you think you have qualified for the Arrowmens Service Award this last year, or would like to qualify next year, it is not to late, or early to get yours. Talk to your lodge officer(s) or adviser(s) today!


