SummitCorps 2011 Orca Lodge Sends Two Staff for Week 3



combined efforts of the trail work

and the overhead to organize this event resulted in 78,544 volunteer hours, which has estimated value of more than \$1.6 million.

SummitCorps hosted 1404 Scouts and Scout leaders to West Virginia during the month of July, with a new crew arriving each week to construct more than 12 miles of trail at New River Gorge National River. According to Sam Bellomy, the Youth Incident Commander for week four, "It is amazing to see the willingness of the Scouts to give their time, effort and generosity to this community by building trails

for generations of community members and for people across the world who will visit this area. Between the trail work and the charitable donations and everything this project has done for the community, it demonstrates the perfect example of servant leadership."

For the majority of the volunteers, it was their first time in West Virginia. They paid their own way to travel here and perform arduous trail work for free; leaving a legacy for anyone to enjoy for years to come.

Joining the SummitCorps from Orca Lodge were Bruce Mayfield, an Operations Branch Manager and Jason Kracht a Division Manager for Week 3. In addition to having a great time, they both reported a lack of sleep, 5-10 miles of trail walking per day and the satisfaction of a job well done.

The Scouts did not stop at just giving sweat equity to West Virginia. Each week, they held a patchauction to raise money for local charities and organizations. Trading patches-a time held tradition in Scouting, enabled participants to turn cloth into cash and patches into possibility. In total the Scouts raised \$15,357.50 through weekly patch auctions. The money raised will support Brian's Safehouse, Burlington United Methodist Children's Home, Just For Kids, Mt. Hope Children's Health Council, Three Rivers Avian Center

(animal shelter for injured and endangered wild birds), the Women's Resource Center, and the Youth Museum of Southern West Virginia, Inc,. Taking the OA motto of Cheerful Service to the next level they also raised more than \$1000 through a bake sale. Funds from the sale went to a Raleigh County 911 dispatcher who is suffering from cancer and struggling with medical expenses. Other organizations that benefitted from



four-week service project included the Pine Haven Homeless Shelter, located in Beckley, where 5600 pounds of food was donated

which provided more than 100 people daily with nutritious meals (each meal provided 1700 calories) throughout the month of July. Local organizations that provide community meals and food giveaways also received 4200 non-perishable meals valued at more than \$25,000.

The values of the Order of the Arrow members are reflected in the cheerful service they provided to the communities

> of Southern West Virginia. While the SummitCorps trail project takes the participant along the

"Evolution of the leader" in four components, (heart, mind, body, and spirit), the overall experience allowed the participants to engage in a personal connection to the land, the local community, and to one another.

This is just the beginning of an ongoing relationship with the National Park Service, neighboring communities, and

Passed away on Aug. 11, 2011, in Eureka, Calif. Rich was born on May 26, 1958, in Eureka to Helen and Orval Overholt. He attended Scotia Elementary School and Fortuna Union High School, graduating in 1976 competing in baseball and basketball. He has been continuously registered in Boy Scouting since joining Cub Scout

Pack 6 in Scotia in 1966. He earned the rank of Eagle Scout in 1976 and served as the Senior Patrol leader for the local troop at the National Jamboree in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

He was a member of the Order of the Arrow, achieving the Vigil Honor and holding local positions and serving as the Section 3B Secretary. As an adult he was involved in numerous volunteer positions for local, council, and regional Scouting. Rich was an assistant scoutmaster for Troop 6 in Scotia for years and chaired numerous Cub Scout and Webelos youth and adult trainings.

He served on the staffs of many Pow Wows, Scout Leader and outdoor trainings, Day Camps and Scout Camporees. He served on the Camp Masonite-Navarro summer staff and was a member of the Western Region Resident Camp Visitation Team. As an adult, he was awarded the District Boy Scout Leader Award, The Pacific Rivers District award of Merit, and the Silver Beaver Award.

 ${\sf R}$ ich could always be counted on to attend and step up to the plate when ever there was an "onerous task or weighty responsibility" as he lived the life of an arrowmen in and out of Scouting. Orca Lodge will miss sorely miss Rich.

Kitty Harriman A Women Before her Time



Viola Jessimine Harriman, born on October 1, 1921, peacefully passed away in the comfort of her home, with her family at her side, on the evening of June 28, 2011. She was preceded in death by her husband of almost 50 years, and long time Scouter, Dale A. Harriman.

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m V}$ iola, more commonly

known as "Kitty," as she was referred to by her family from a very young age and throughout her life by those she considered friends, was the oldest of nine children. She lived out her life in Del Norte County, where she and Dale raised their children, and later the grandchildren.

In her younger years, Kitty was a waitress, then during World War II when the women of our nation were called on to fill traditionally male positions, Kitty worked as a welder. Later she became employed as a bank teller, working at the Crescent City branch of Bank of America.

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m W}$ hen Kitty and Dale married, she was able to stay at home as a homemaker. As the children got older, Kitty became very involved in Scouting with her son and daughter. She started out as a den mother for the Boy Scouts, and a Brownie troop leader for the Girl Scouts. Her volunteer and service work with Scouting ended up becoming a major part of her life. She ended up becoming an Explorer Post leader teaching our youth about Native American culture, dances, bead work, and costume making.

It was during this time that Kitty was introduced to the Order of the Arrow. She was inducted into Mow-A-Toc lodge where she became Dance team and Ceremonies Adviser. With Kitty's nurturing and guidance, Mow-A-Toc Lodge would remain a force in Native American Dancing for many years. In 1973, Kitty attended the 1st and only NOAC ever held west of the Rockies at Santa Barbara to advise the Dance Team in the National Dance Competition. The team did well, unfortunately, the BSA at that time didn't allow female arrowmen and she was escourted out of the conference. It would be almost 15 more years before the OA allowed female members. In the meantime Kitty was selected by her lodge to receive the Vigil Honor and to the best of our knowledge is the 1st women to ever be so honored. A good thing the National office never realized that "K. Harriman" was not just another guy.

Kitty also held the postiion of Assistant District Commissioner for Redwood Empire Council for over 35 years. Her effort, dedication, and commitment to the youth that she influenced, led, nurtured, and helped to raise can still be seen today and will always be felt by those lives that she touched.
